House Finance committee wraps first review of budget bill

The House Finance Committee this week concluded its initial review of House Bill (HB) 33, the biennial budget bill. House lawmakers will take a two-week recess beginning next week, during which time House leadership will review hundreds of budget amendments submitted by lawmakers. The House will unveil its version of the budget bill on either April 18 or 19, with a second round of changes occurring the following week at which point the House will hold a vote on the bill and send it to the Senate for consideration.

Members of the Fair School Funding Workgroup provided testimony on Wednesday afternoon. Committee members, including Rep. **Jamie Callender** and Rep. **Tracy Richardson**, challenged the workgroup on the option to simply accelerate the phase in of the formula rather than update the fiscal years of the base cost inputs and continue phasing in the formula. Other discussions surrounded school resource officers, local capacity, and pupil transportation. You can watch the question-and-answer portion of the workgroup's testimony here.

Meanwhile, Tony and Will this week continued their advocacy with House and Senate lawmakers on the minimum funding floor proposal, which would increase from 5% to 10% the minimum state share percentage for FY 2024 and 2025, with an increase to 20% occurring in future fiscal years. Committees review bills

House and Senate lawmakers held hearings on a variety of bills this week, as most committees plan for a two-week recess away from Columbus beginning next week. Committee action included:

- opponent testimony on House Bill (HB) 1, which enacts income and property tax law changes. BASA, OSBA, and OASBO provided opponent testimony, along with a variety of local government groups, all of whom received little to no questions from committee members.
- proponent testimony on Senate Bill (SB) 1, which creates the Department of Education and Workforce and revises the duties of the State Board of Education;
- passage of SB 49, with amendments, which provides up to three religious release days for students;
- sponsor testimony on SB 17, which incorporates free market capitalism into the high school financial literacy standards and model curriculum, and HB 70, which requires school districts to adopt a policy on over-the-counter drugs;
- proponent testimony on SB 66, which requires public and private schools to transmit a transferred student's records within five school days;
- sponsor testimony on SB 79, which modifies the law for dropout prevention and recovery schools.
- opponent testimony on HB 47, which requires AEDs in schools. There was no testimony.

• proponent testimony on HB 6, which requires schools, colleges, and universities to designate separate single-sex sports teams and prohibits males from participating on female teams, among other provisions.

Heard around the Statehouse

"We can fund inputs, or we can fund the full formula this General Assembly. Doing both is a really difficult thing to do. We're looking at potentially an increase of \$670 million in FY 2024 and upwards of \$850 million in FY 2025, just for the inputs alone. These are substantive numbers. I want my peers and all of us in the room because they are significant." - Rep. **Tracy Richardson**, speaking in House Finance Committee to the funding workgroup members.

"If we continually move the base year...if we increase that, we can never hit... it's a moving target that the legislature can never ever attain, so we would never be fully phased in because the base number moves as we go. What is your response to that criticism? That almost kept us from getting it passed two years ago." - Rep. Jamie Callender, in House Finance Committee referring to the issue of updating the fiscal year for the base cost component of the formula versus simply increasing the formula's phase-in percentages with no other updates.

"By delaying the phase in and instead changing the base year, we move achieving (all districts to be on the formula) out ever further. And if we keep moving the base year every two years, we'll never get there." - Rep. Jamie Callender.
