Senate considers property valuation bill, House action expected next week

<u>Senate Bill (SB) 153</u>, the companion to <u>House Bill (HB) 187</u>, received proponent testimony this week, with only a handful of witnesses testifying in support. SB 153 would base the property valuation data for reappraisals and updates equally on the three most recent year's worth of data, rather than weighing the most recent year greater than others. This would effectively soften the significantly high property valuation increases seen across many of the counties <u>undergoing update or reappraisal this year</u>.

Meanwhile, the House is expected to use its "if-needed" session date next Tuesday, Oct. 3 to pass HB 187. Lawmakers are expected to amend the bill on the floor to include an emergency clause, making it go into effect immediately upon the governor's signature, rather than 91 days after that action.

SB 153 does not include a provision contained in HB 187 that would permanently revise the process regarding the determination of final property values for updates and reappraisals. Under current law, the state Tax Commissioner reviews county auditors' updated values for updates and reappraisals, and if they determine necessary, orders adjustments to those values.

HB 187 would flip that process, giving county auditors the final authority in establishing values and allowing the Tax Commissioner to merely recommend a change or appeal an auditor's decision or indecision to the Board of Tax Appeals. This change is supported by county auditors and could pose problems with financial planning and tax uniformity issues for schools and local governments.

Report card and state test data reviewed

Ohio Redistricting Commission adopts legislative maps

In a bipartisan vote, the Ohio Redistricting Commission this week approved the use of House and Senate legislative maps. The House and Senate maps, which are accessible here, are in effect for the next eight years. Under the maps, 61 of the 99 House seats are solidly Republican, with 11 tossup seats. 23 of the 33 Senate seats are solidly Republican, with four tossup seats. The current composition of the House is

67 Republicans, 32 Democrats, and the composition of the Senate is 26 Republicans and seven Democrats.

Heard around the Statehouse
